East Tytherley parish profile

This profile provides a summary of the latest available information on the demographic make-up of the East Tytherley parish within Test Valley. It looks at information on topics such as the population structure and provides economic, housing, health and educational information for the parish.

East Tytherley is one of the 59 parishes in Test Valley. It has an area of 1,061 hectares which represents 1.7% of the total area of Test Valley.

Residents

The estimated 2016 population of East Tytherley parish is 180. This is expected to fall by 2021 to 172 (a fall of 4.4%).

East Tytherley's resident population is 51.1% female and 48.9% male.

Young people (0-19) currently make up 19.4% of East Tytherley's population; this is expected to rise to 20.3% by 2021.

Young adults (20-39) currently make up 16.1% of the parish's population; this is expected to rise to 18.0% by 2021.

Middle aged residents (40-64) currently account for 46.7% of East Tytherley's population; this is expected to fall to 39.5% by 2021.

Those **aged 65 and over** make up 17.8% of the parish's population; this is expected to rise to 22.1% by 2021.

Those **aged 85 and over** currently represent 2.8% of the population; this is expected to rise slightly to 2.9% by 2021.

Ethnicity

The largest ethnic group in East Tytherley is "White" at 99.5% of the parish's population. That compares with a figure of 95.9% for Test Valley as a whole and 95.0% for Hampshire.

The second largest ethnic group (0.5%) is "Asian/Asian British". That compares with 2.0% for Test Valley as a whole and 2.7% for Hampshire.



Households

East Tytherley parish has **76 households**, which represent 0.2% of Test Valley's 47,626 households. The household split by tenure is shown below (tenure refers to the financial arrangements under which a home is occupied).







The largest proportion of properties (46.1%) are **owned by those who live in them**. This is lower than the Test Valley average of 70.4%.

31.6% of East Tytherley households are **privately rented**, and 17.1% are **socially rented**. This compares to 12.9% and 14.4% respectively across Test Valley.



Households by number of residents

44.7% of East Tytherley's households are occupied by two people, and 18.4% by one person. 36.8% of the parish's households are occupied by more than two people.

East Tytherley has 9 households with **dependent children aged 0 to 4**. That represents 11.8% of the Parish's households.

25 households in the Parish have **dependent children of all ages**. That represents 32.9% of the Parish's households.

House prices

According to Zoopla, the average house price in East Tytherley (as of March 2016) is **£616,448**. This has increased by 21.2% in the last five years.

It is estimated that **39.4% of households in central rural Test Valley cannot afford to buy a private property**. The central rural area includes the wards of Dun Valley, Kings Somborne and Michelmersh, Blackwater, and Broughton and Stockbridge.

Properties by Council Tax Band

20.0% of East Tytherley properties are at the **lower** end of the property market (Bands A and B). This compares to 22.2% for Test Valley as a whole.

53.4% of the parish's properties are in the **middle** range of the property market (Bands C to E). This compares to 60.8% across the whole borough.

26.7% of East Tytherley's properties are at the **higher** end of the property market (Bands F to H). This compares to 17.1% of all Test Valley properties.





Education

30.1% of East Tytherley's residents have achieved **level 4 qualifications** and above compared to 30.5% in Test Valley as a whole. 11.8% of East Tytherley's residents have **no qualifications**, compared to 18.4% in Test Valley.

Employment

78.4% of East Tytherley residents aged 16-74 are **economically active**, compared to 73.4% of Test Valley residents. This includes people in full-, partand self-employment, those who are actively seeking a job, and full-time students.

The remaining 21.6% of residents aged 16-74 are **economically inactive**, compared to 26.6% of Test Valley residents. This includes people who are retired, long-term sick or disabled, or who look after the home and family.

This bus service runs between Winchester and Stockbridge via several Test Valley villages, including East Tytherley.	Dial-a-Ride provides weekly door-to-door transport. The service is available to anyone who has no access to, or experiences difficulty with using public bus services. The service takes residents into Andover or Romsey to access local amenities.
