Resource Sheet - Local Recycling Centres



There are over 100 Local Recycling Centres (LRCs) across Test Valley. LRCs provide residents with the opportunity to recycle more items than can just be put in their brown bin at home. Recycling these items at an LRC prevents them from being put into black household waste bins.

The following items can be recycled at our Local Recycling Centres:

- ★ Glass bottles and jars
- ★ Clothes, bedding and towels (also referred to as 'Textiles')
- ★ Shoes
- ★ Aluminium foil
- ★ Books
- ★ DVDs and CDs (also referred to as 'Media')
- ★ Food and drink cartons

General Local Recycling Centre hints and tips

Don't want to make a special trip?

It is easy to make a visit to an LRC part of your family routine by finding a site on the way to school, the shops or an after school club.

Take your litter home

If you have brought your items to the site in plastic bag, please reuse it or dispose of it in a litter bin. If there is not a bin, please take it home.

Cardboard boxes should be taken home and recycled in your brown bin.

Collect items for the LRC in a reusable container to avoid extra waste.

Full collection banks

Overflowing textile and media banks usually have instructions on the front for reporting overflowing collection banks. Alternatively, these can be reported to Customer Services on 01264 368000 or 01794 527700. Issues can also be reported online or using the My Test Valley App.

Hints and tips for recycling glass:

- ★ Rinse glass bottles and jars to remove any food or drink left in them.
- ★ To make things simple at home, collect glass separately from other recyclables. Having a bag or a box for glass bottles and jars means there is no chance of them mixing with items for your brown bin or ending up in your black bin.
- ★ **Ssssshhhh!** Please consider people living close to LRCs and only use glass banks between 8am and 8pm.
- ★ If a collection bank is full, do not leave glass bottles and jars on the floor. Overflowing collection banks should be reported to Test Valley Borough Council

Glass recycling facts and figures

- ★ Glass can be recycled as individual colours (green, brown, clear) or mixed together.
- ★ Glass can be recycled over and over again without it losing quality.
- ★ Toughened glass (used for drinking glasses, vases, mirrors and windows) cannot be recycled because it contains additional chemicals that gives it a higher melting point than bottles and jars.
- ★ In the UK, by recycling our glass, we save enough energy to chill 34 bottles of wine each day for every household!

Hints and tips for recycling clothes and shoes:

- ★ Clothes should be put in bags and tied securely to keep them clean and dry.
- ★ Shoes should be in pairs, either tied together by the laces or in a bag.
- ★ Clothes that are in a wearable condition are used in three ways:
 - ★ Donated to people in crisis
 - ★ Sold in charity shops
 - ★ Sent to be sold in countries where clothes are not widely affordable or available.
- ★ Clothes that at are damaged or in poor condition can still be recycled in textile collection banks. These items are shredded and used to make carpet underlay, sound proofing in cars and insulation.
- ★ Textile banks usually have instructions on them for reporting them as full.

Textiles recycling facts and figures

- ★ An estimated £140 million worth of clothing is wasted every year.
- ★ The average UK household owns around £4,000 worth of clothes, but around 30% hasn't been worn for at least a year.
- ★ Extending the average life of clothes by nine months would save £5 billion in resources used to supply, launder and dispose of clothing.

Hints and tips for recycling aluminium foil

- ★ Collect foil in a small bag, separated from the recycling that will be going in your brown bin.
- ★ Takeaway trays should be empty and rinsed to remove any excess food.
- ★ Some items, like crisp packets, can look like aluminium foil, but are actually made from plastic film coated in metal. These items cannot be recycled and must be placed in your black bin.
- ★ **Scrunch test-** To check if an item is made from foil or metallised plastic film, simply scrunch the item in your hand. If it remains 'scrunched' it is foil; if it springs back then it is metallised plastic film and cannot be recycled.

Aluminium foil recycling facts and figures

- ★ Aluminium cannot be recycled in your brown bin because it cannot be accurately sorted from other items at the Materials Recovery Facility.
- ★ Aluminium is the world's second most used metal and can be recycled over and over again without it losing quality.
- ★ Aluminium recycling is 95% more efficient than manufacturing new foil.
- ★ In Test Valley, foil is collected, sorted and crushed by Magpie Community Recycling which provides opportunities for people with learning disabilities to learn new skills.

Hints and tips for recycling books and media

- ★ Make sure books are not damaged or missing any pages.
- ★ Items can be placed in bags before putting them in the collection banks.
- ★ Make sure discs are in the correct cases.
- ★ Make sure box sets and multiple disc packs are complete.

Books and media recycling facts and figures

★ Books cannot be recycled with other paper items because they contain glue to bind them together.

- ★ Find out where your nearest collection banks are. Collection banks can be found at:

 - ★ Romsey Bus Station, Broadwater Road, Romsey, SO51 8GT
 - ★ Tesco Extra, River Way, Andover, SP10 1UZ
 - ★ Valley Park Community Centre Car Park, Pilgrims Close, SO53 4ST
- ★ Rinse and squash empty cartons to save space
- ★ Remove lids where possible

Food and drink carton recycling facts and figures

- ★ Cartons are made from 2 or 3 materials:
 - ★ paperboard made from wood fibre (typically 75%)
 - ★ low density plastic polyethylene (typically 21%)
 - ★ aluminium foil (typically 4% and only in long-life packages
- ★ Cartons banks are emptied by a large machine that acts like a vacuum to suck cartons out of the bank before they are taken to a paper mill in Yorkshire to be turned into new cartons.
