Levy Road / Picket Twenty (lane) south update

Persimmon Homes and Hampshire County Council are working together towards the completion of all necessary drainage repairs and improvement works required on Picket Twenty (Lane) south as well as the essential resurfacing of part of Picket Twenty (Lane) and subsequently the completion of the construction of Levy Road. Persimmon Homes will provide residents of homes in this area with more details via a letter informing them of the work with prior warning of when it will take place. A copy of the letter will be posted on the Community Associations web page and on the community noticeboard on Quicksilver Way.

Road adoption

This normally happens with an agreement voluntarily entered into by a developer and the Highway Authority (Hampshire County Council) under the terms of Section 38 of the Highways Act 1980. The main stages are as follows:

- The developer designs the works and the Highway Authority approves the design. At this stage the areas to be adopted are agreed.
- The developer constructs and supervises the work, the Highway Authority inspects the works.

- Once the works are considered satisfactory they will be subject to a maintenance period, normally 12 months. At the end of this period and subject to further inspection they can be adopted.
- The legal agreement can be entered into at any time during this process.
- There is no requirement for the developer to enter in to such agreements if they wish the roads to remain private and take on the maintenance liability themselves or set up a management company to do so. Equally, the Highway Authority may decline to enter in to an agreement if requested.

Public Consultation on Traffic Management and Parking Restrictions

An informal public consultation, lasting 3 weeks, is planned to take place in the Autumn for the whole of the Alamein, Winton and St Mary's Wards. Picket Twenty is within the St Mary's Ward, which means there will be the opportunity for residents to participate in the consultation and contribute their thoughts, raise any concerns and advise the Borough Council on either of the above for Picket Twenty and the area as a whole. The submissions at the informal consultation will help to inform the proposals which will then be the subject of a Statutory Consultation later this year. Parking

Some residents have raised concerns about people parking in inconsiderate and inappropriate places at Picket Twenty. This poses problems for those trying to safely access areas of the community. Here are some suggestions to highlight where not to park to ensure parking only occurs where it is safe and sensible.

Places where parking is not permitted include:

On bends – This creates hazardous circumstances for drivers who are travelling around corners, as cars parked on corners of the roadside force other vehicles onto the opposite and wrong side of the road. The parked vehicle potentially reduces the ability of drivers to see approaching vehicles and other road users.

On or near road junctions - This seriously reduces the visibility at junctions for other drivers and therefore increases the risk of a collision between vehicles already on and vehicles joining roads. This is the case on any type of junction, whether it be on junctions along Picket Twenty Way, the main spine road, or on side roads leading to residents parking courtyards.



Pavements - Rule 218 of the Highway Code says: “Do not park partially or wholly on the pavement unless signs permit it”. Vehicles parked on pavements can create a hazard:

1. To pedestrians by causing an obstruction that may result in them having to step off the pavement into the carriageway, thus putting themselves in danger.
2. By restricting the width of the pavement and making it difficult for someone with a pushchair or wheelchair to pass safely - again this person may have to enter the carriageway to avoid the obstruction.
3. A further reason is the potential damage caused to the surface of the pavement which are not designed to take the weight of vehicles.

Beside dropped kerbs or on raised crossings – This causes an obstruction to pedestrians and those using pushchairs, wheelchairs or mobility scooters as they try to navigate safely on pavements and across roads.

At or opposite bus stops – This causes an obstruction to buses on their designated routes and has the potential to cause a complete road block for other vehicles wishing to pass by, while buses are legitimately waiting at bus stops according to their timetables. As bus stops are clearly marked with signs, it should be easy to see where it is not appropriate to park.

Street nameplates

Persimmon Homes have recently installed street nameplates for Telegraph Road and have the street nameplates for Mercury Drive and parts of Picket Twenty Way on order. These will be installed once they have arrived on site. All other occupied streets, which are currently without nameplates, will have them installed once the corresponding signs have been ordered and received by Persimmons.

Street lights

Persimmon Homes have completed a night time audit of all street lighting columns on Picket Twenty in order to identify which street lighting columns were not working. Persimmon Homes also identified that these columns were not working due to a variety of different reasons and have now set about having them all repaired. They have been able to complete basic repairs to some, which are now working fully. Whilst others require more technical work, for which Persimmon's have instructed their contractor to work with SSE to complete all the necessary repairs.

Wooden bollards

Persimmon Homes have responded to resident's concerns about the hazards posed by damaged wooden bollards by sawing them off at ground level to reduce the risk of injury. The bollards were installed to prevent vehicles parking on pedestrian areas which are adjacent to roads. Please can residents park their vehicles in their allocated car parking spaces.

Landscape maintenance

Picket Twenty boasts a lovely number of green spaces, ranging from small pockets of planted areas to the vast Urban Park. These areas are managed and maintained by a variety of different organisations and therefore any concerns or enquiries relating to them ought to be reported to the correct organisation directly if they are known. In order for residents to know who to report issues to, work is being conducted by the Community Development Worker, Jenny Brain to create a reference map to indicate which organisations manage each area. Once completed, this map will be made available to the public for future reference. There currently remain a handful of areas, which have not been maintained consistently and so Jenny is in the process of clarifying who is responsible for these areas so they can be added to the map. Housing occupations update

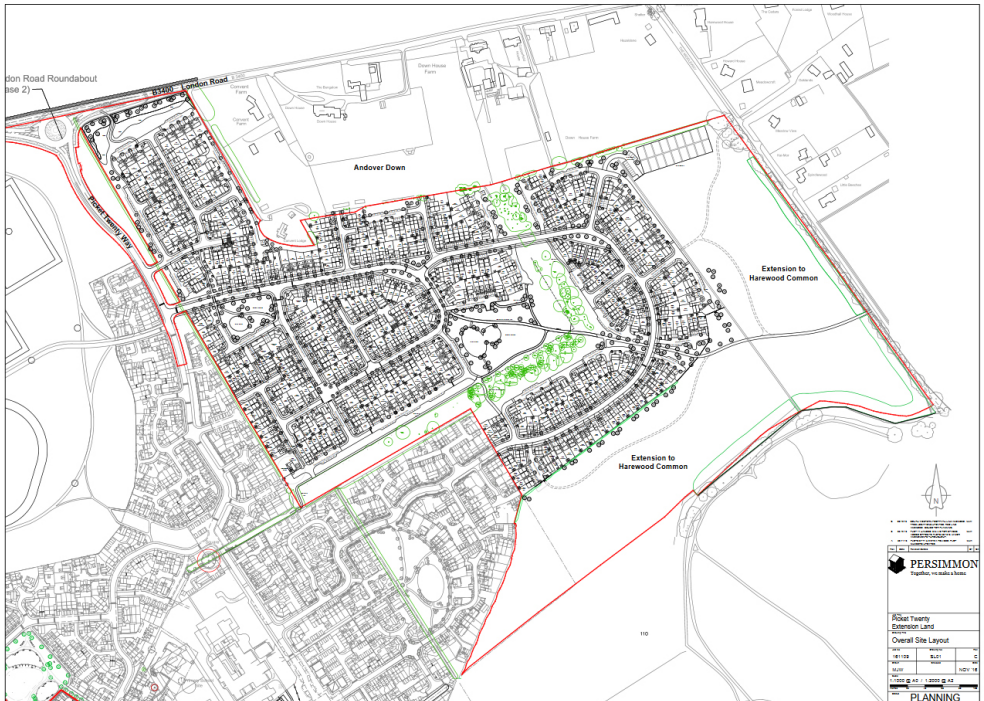

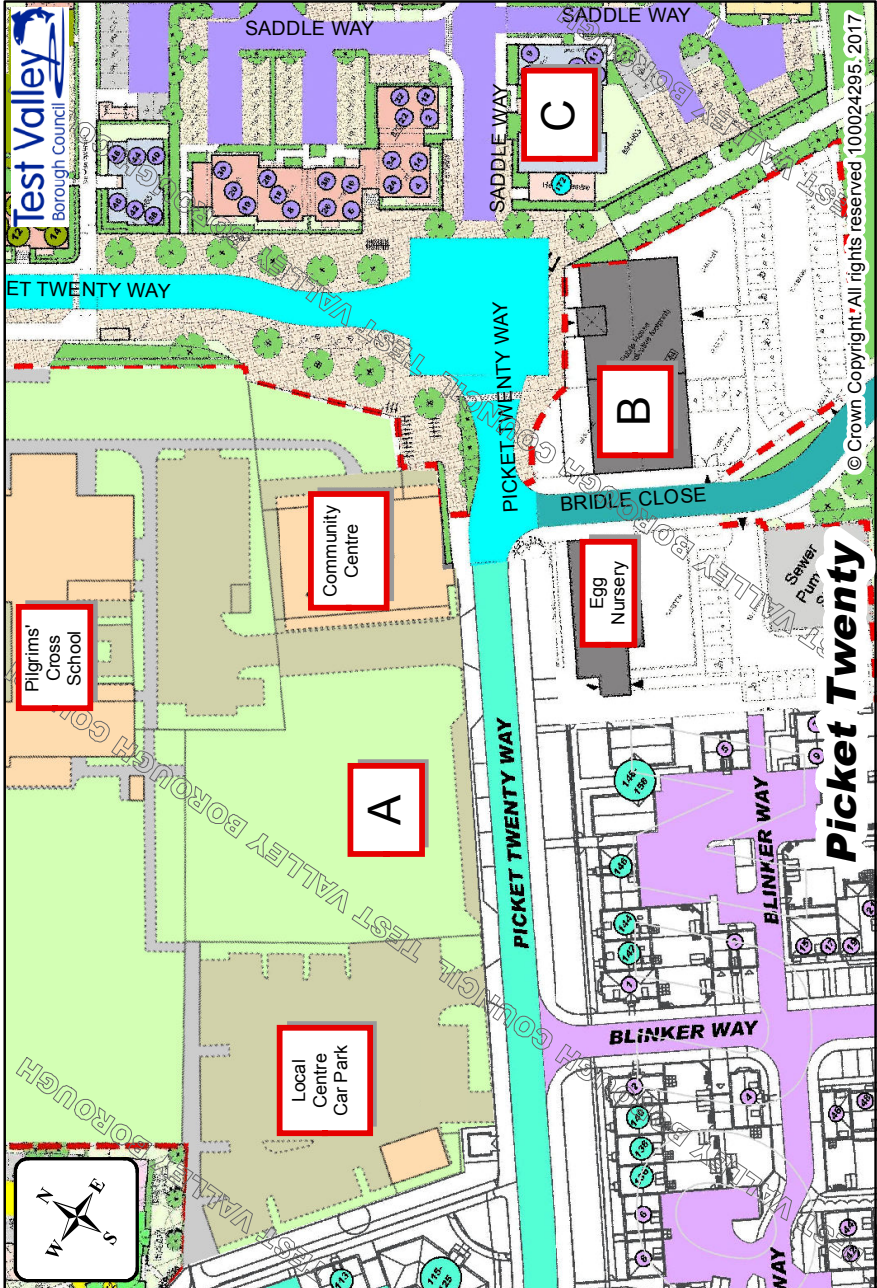
Picket Twenty Extension Site Planning Application

Persimmon Homes submitted a Planning Application to the Planning Authority, Test Valley Borough Council in December 2016, seeking to expand the existing Picket Twenty development. The application is for the erection of 520 homes (including 208 affordable homes), public open spaces (including play areas and an extension to the Harewood Common buffer zone), allotments and associated infrastructure. Access to which is being proposed from Picket Twenty Way and from Phase 4 of the approved Picket Twenty new community.

Amended plans have recently been received and comments are currently being invited on these proposals. The Planning Application can be viewed and commented on via the Test Valley Borough Council, Planning & Building pages, by entering the following reference into the search bar: 16/03120/FULLN

Information regarding the sale of the plots designated for the Retail Unit (Shop) and Public House (Pub) have been requested and a Senior Development Planner of Persimmon Homes South Coast has recently provided the following updates;

A: Retail Unit (Shop)

“Persimmon Homes has been actively pursuing an occupier for the retail unit within the Local Centre for a number of years, however it has been considered by potential occupiers, that due to the relatively low number of completed dwellings at the site, potential occupation of the retail unit would be unviable until the Picket Twenty development is nearly complete.

The Picket Twenty development is now in the final stages which has rejuvenated interest in the retail unit. Persimmon Homes can confirm it is currently in advanced discussions with a potential occupier for a retail unit to provide a convenience store. It is hoped an agreement can be finalised in the coming weeks, at which point the identity of the occupier can be confirmed. The provision of a retail unit will be subject to a planning application which will hopefully be submitted later in the year.”

B: Public House (Pub)

“The pub site within the Local Centre has been extensively marketed to potential national and local occupiers but to date there has been no firm interest in the site.

Specialist marketing agents will continue to extensively market the pub site on behalf of Persimmon.”

Information regarding the sale of the plot designated for the Health / Clinical facility has been sought and the following update provided;

C: Health / Clinical Facility

“As part of the planning consent for major development areas such as Picket Twenty, the Council identifies what facilities will be required to support that community in what is sometimes referred to as a “local centre”. Historically this has sometimes included, where relevant, land for premises for a new health/clinical facility which could for example be a GP surgery. There is no development funding to support building a GP surgery and the West Hampshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) primary care strategy supports practices working collaboratively to meet local population need. The approach taken for Picket Twenty when the planning application was originally dealt with was identified by the planners as land only. The developers have been marketing the development in line with a marketing policy agreed with the Council. Thus far there has been no interest from any potential purchaser/occupier for these purposes. The CCG has subsequently confirmed to the Planning Policy team that they in fact are not looking to support any additional GP practices in Andover and are instead looking to address the increased patient numbers through increased capacity at the closest existing practice.”

Urban Park updates



The Urban Park is located to the north of the Picket Twenty development and covers over 25 hectares. The park includes 7 full size football pitches, a cricket square and a perimeter surfaced route measuring 1 mile, which is excellent for running, dog walking and is a great place for cycling.

The venue has been used for the first time this year for football with 78 matches played since January 2017. Andover Youth football club hosted their junior football tournament on site in June, which attracted teams from across the area with hundreds of children taking part. Andover Wheelers cycling club have been using the Sports Pavilion and car park as a venue for time trialling along the A303 this summer.

Work continues to bring existing and new facilities into use at the Urban Park. These include:

- Outdoor gym equipment which will be installed in September.
- Perimeter route distance markers – this surfaced route will be lined with distance markers and app segments set up for you to measure your performance
- Test Valley Borough Council are working with Persimmon Homes to get the tennis court completed and available for public use.
- Designs for the junior play equipment will be available for comment in September along with the location of the relocated Multi Use Games Area.
- Future aspirations to improve the recreation value of the Urban Park are being explored, along with how the Sports Pavilion building can be brought into full public use every day of the week.
- The cricket pitch will be available for hire from Spring 2018.

Harewood Common

Harewood Common comprises of nearly 10 Hectares of chalk grassland rich in wildlife. Now under the management of Test Valley Borough Council's Parks and Countryside Team, Harewood Common will provide a refreshing contrast to the close mown landscape of the Urban Park. The site will be managed with wildlife at its heart, whilst providing access to the public. Originally an agricultural field, Harewood Common backs onto the mature woodland at Harewood Forest. Its past management as a hay meadow makes it an ideal place to encourage wildlife to thrive. During the spring and summer months the meadows will be alive with butterflies including meadow brown and marbled white, along with many other insects, and on a warm summer evening you will see bats darting across the field in search of a meal. Its close proximity to Harewood Forest will mean we are likely to see many other woodland animals that come onto the fields to feed, including deer and owls.

Harewood Common is being managed through cattle grazing. Grazing for conservation provides a sensitive alternative to mowing, with cattle stocked at low densities, which will graze the grass at varying heights to allow wildflowers to flourish. Grazing will take place between April and October, with the fields remaining open to the public throughout. During this time dog walkers will be asked to keep their dogs under close control and on a lead around livestock to prevent any disturbance to the animals. A multi use bin has been installed on the entrance off of Bridle Close. We ask that you please place all litter and dog waste in the bins provided. Dog waste, which is not only unsightly and harmful to ourselves is also harmful to the cattle grazing the fields as it can be a source of disease.

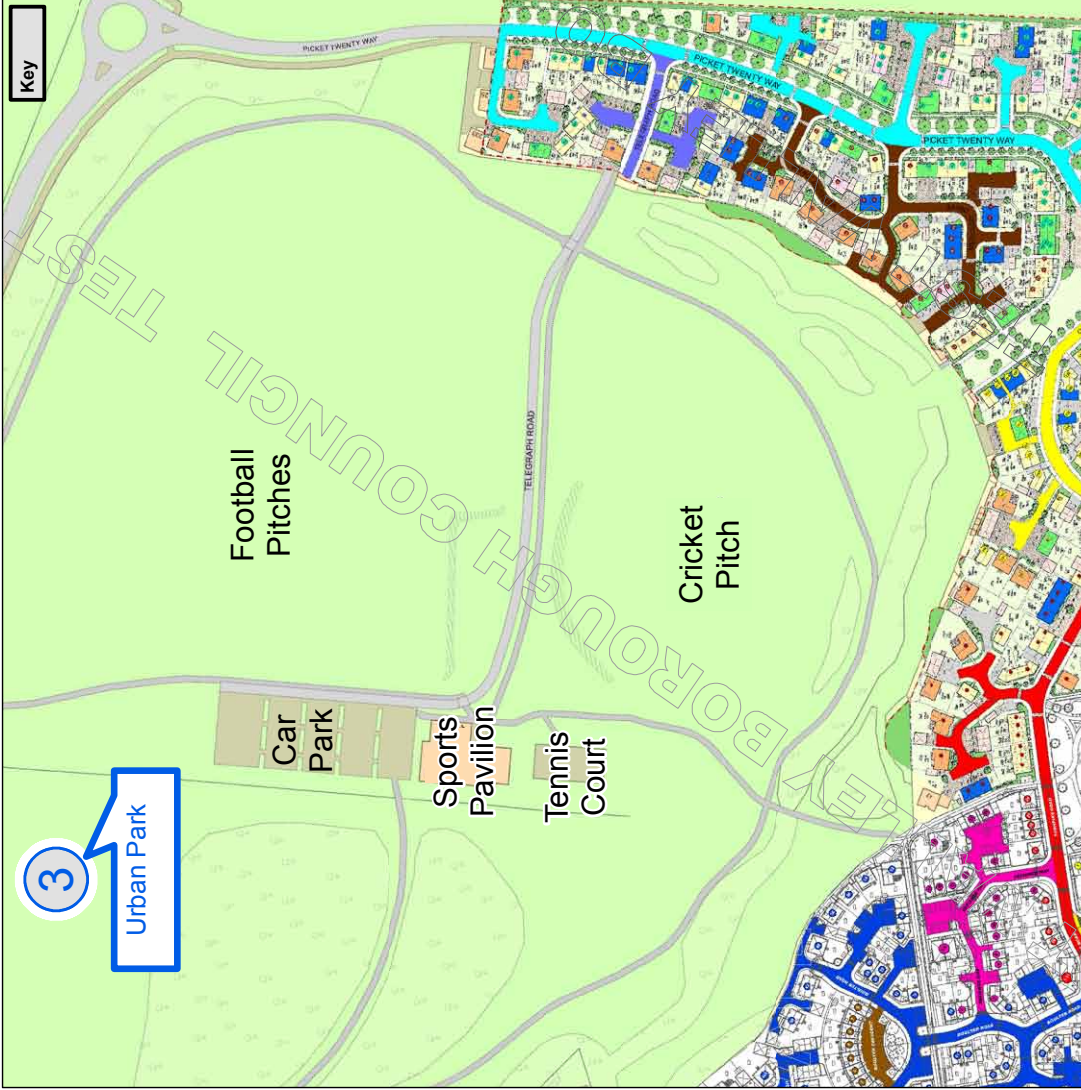

Picket Twenty Cycle Discount Voucher Scheme

The cycle discount vouchers are available to those who are first occupants of their homes only and are limited to 1 per household. They are issued on a first come, first served basis until the available funds are depleted.

The discount voucher can be put towards the cost of a bicycle, bicycle accessories or bicycle repairs/ servicing at one of the local participating bike shops listed:

Terms & Conditions for Picket Twenty Cycle Discount Voucher Scheme

The discount vouchers are limited to 1 per household and only available to those who are **first occupants** of their homes. The discount voucher must not be given away, sold to or used by anyone other than the person and household it was issued to. The discount vouchers will be issued on a first come, first served basis, until the funds are depleted. The vouchers are **valid for 3 months** from the date it was issued. Please look after your discount voucher once you receive it, because if you lose it, damage it, or if it is stolen, we cannot replace it. The discount voucher may only be used towards the purchase of bicycles, bicycle accessories or bike repairs/servicing. The voucher can only be used once, in one shop and no change either in cash, credit note, or voucher will be given for purchases under £50.

The Cycle Discount Scheme for Picket Twenty residents has been made possible by Test Valley Borough Council receiving funds from Persimmon Homes Ltd to help promote cycling.

Public transport at Picket Twenty

Picket Twenty is serviced by two bus companies, Stagecoach and Wheelers, who both offer routes to and from Andover as well as some very useful stops included as part of these regular services. Numerous bus stops for both services are clearly signposted at intervals along Picket Twenty Way.



Stagecoach - no. 76 bus: Andover - Basingstoke (including Picket Twenty)

The Stagecoach no. 76 Service is a route from Andover to Basingstoke and vice versa, including Picket Twenty in both directions. This provides people the option to travel to and from either Andover or Basingstoke from Picket Twenty, with a number of additional stops along the route.

The Wheelers no. 10 Bus Service is a route from Andover to Picket Twenty, including stops at Andover Bus Station, Andover Train Station and Andover War Memorial to name a few.

Discounted Bus Passes (Ts&Cs apply)

Following the receipt of some funds from the developer, residents who are the first occupants of a property within the new development at Picket Twenty, can apply for up to 1 years worth of subsidised bus travel between Picket Twenty and Andover. Residents may choose between a pass for use on either the Stagecoach or Wheelers services, but not both. The bus passes cost £10 (payable by cheque, debit card or postal order at the Council Offices, Beech Hurst) for 3 months. The passes are limited to 1 per household (first occupants only) on a first come first served basis, until funds are depleted. The bus pass is transferable between members of the same household and can be used during bus operating hours to access key services and facilities within the town. If you're interested then all you need to do is complete an application form and along with the required ID visit the Council Offices at Beech Hurst and make your payment.

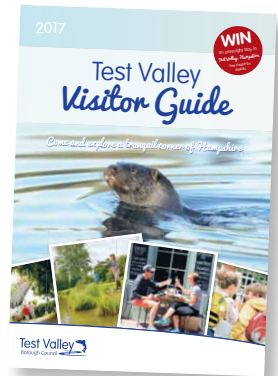

Test Valley Health Walks

Picket Twenty Health Walk
